
Trash Collection Rate Increase for City Residents



Effective January 1, 2023, trash collection rates will increase by \$6.00 per month for City residents (\$21.50 per month, \$64.50 per quarter). This change comes as part of increased costs in the

City's renewed agreement with Rumpke. There will be no changes in routes, service day, recycling, container rentals, or level of service (unlimited); however, Rumpke defines "unlimited" trash as six containers or bags. If you have more than this amount or a larger item, please call Rumpke to schedule a bulk pick-up. Outdoor Warning System (OWS)

The City of Bellbrook accepted proposals for the installation of an outdoor warning system in August 2022 and it was installed in November 2022. The system is called Sentry Siren, and it is an omnidirectional siren equipped with radio control and AC/DC battery backup. The Sentry Siren is activated by the National Weather Service's Emergency Managers Weather Information Network (EMWIN), which uses real-time weather data published by EMWIN, along with state-of-the-art HD weather radar. Activation by the National Weather Service will be issued using the polygon shape model, which is intended to warn only the locations and people inside the polygon of impending severe weather. When a tornado warning is issued, the sirens activate the system and send out emails and text messages, and make social media posts with important weather updates. Based on FEMA's guidelines for covering atmospheric attenuation, it was recommended that Bellbrook have two warning devices for coverage of the entire City. The first location is behind Fire Station 22, on the corner of West Franklin Street and North Linda Drive and the second location is at the water towers on Ridgeway Road near North Main Street.

City Council is the legislative and policy-making body of the city. The Council comprises a mayor and six council members elected at-large on a non-partisan basis. Awareness Week

Mayor Mike Schweller and City Council presented a proclamation declaring the week of October 16 through



22 as Stormwater Awareness Week. The week brings a call to action to "Be the Change for Clean Water", urging everyone to be mindful of steps they can take to make sure our waterways are clean, preserved, and protected. During Stormwater Awareness Week, Soil and Water Conservation Districts throughout Ohio are urging residents to take one or more of the following actions:

- Check the weather report before applying fertilizer to your lawn or any oil/chemicals to driveways and sidewalks.
- Pick up trash in your neighborhood or local park.
- Make sure lawns have 3-4 inches of topsoil under the grass to reduce runoff.
- Plant native plants that have deep roots.
- Plant a tree in your yard or install a rain garden.
- Never allow anything but rain down the drain.



The Little Miami Watershed Network

The trees have lost their leaves, temperatures are dropping, and the days are getting shorter. Winter is coming! Soon the weather forecasters will start talking about snow and ice, so it's time to get out your winter coats, snow shovels, and for many homeowners, road salt. Salt and other chemical deicers help melt the ice and allow us to get to work and the other places we need to go. Unfortunately, when road salt breaks down in the water to Sodium (Na) and chloride (Cl) and becomes a source of chloride contamination in our lakes and streams. Both water quality and aquatic life are adversely affected by chloride contamination. Thus, salt and other deicing products (which all contain chloride) should be used sparingly and only in certain conditions.

Here are a few ways to reduce your salt use.

Be prepared:

- Redirect downspouts away from sidewalks and driveways.

- Make sure you have the right tools. Inspect your current shovels and scrapers. It may be time to head to the hardware store to buy new ones.

Remove the snow:

- Shovel throughout the snowstorm, and go out early before the snow starts to pile up.
- Don't let the snow pile up and become compacted.
- Scrape any compacted snow or ice.

Check the temperature:

- Salt doesn't work below certain temperatures. Check the product instructions to determine if the salt will work.
- If it is too cold, you can use sand to add traction. Clean up any extra sand and dispose of it properly.
- Salt is unnecessary if it is a warm day and the ice is starting to melt on its own.

Apply salt:

- -When the storm is over, and the snow has been removed. -Only to areas covered with ice.
- In the correct quantity. Check the instructions, using more salt doesn't make it work better or faster.

TikTok Auto Theft Trend

There has been an increase in KIA and Hyundai auto thefts over the last few months. While not an epidemic in our area, these thefts have crept their way into Bellbrook and Sugarcreek – if you own a KIA or Hyundai, you want to be aware! The ease of theft is due to these vehicles not having an ignition immobilizer when the ignition key or key fob is not present. To help combat this trend BPD, as well as the manufacturer recommends one (or more!) of the following:

- Use of a steering wheel lock device ("the Club")
- Seek professional installation of a car alarm or kill switch
- Always lock windows and doors
- Park in a well-lit or secured location
- Install a GPS tracking device



Scams Abound During & After the Pandemic

One of the fastest-growing calls that BPD investigates is the FRAUD complaint. Many types of fraud exist - these are some of the more common ones that BPD investigates:

The "Phishing" scam - You receive an email or text message that appears to be from a well-known source (bank, mortgage company, etc.) and the message asks you to divulge your personal information: SSN, birthdate, account or password information. Don't do it! Financial institutions will never ask for your account or password information.



The "Lotto" scam - You receive a letter, text, or email informing you that you've won a lottery or prize in a foreign country. You are told the winnings will be released to you after a "fee or tax" is collected. If it sounds too good to be true, it usually is! - Don't fall for this ploy.

The "IRS" scam - You receive a telephone call from the "IRS" threatening arrest by local police if you do not immediately pay a fee or fine on "past due taxes" - Don't fall for it! - The IRS will never telephone you directly to demand a resolution on a tax issue.

There are many, many other scams that BPD has investigated. Protect yourself by being aware of what scams are common. For more information, go to the Federal Trade Commission website at www.ftc.gov/news-events/topics/identity-theft.

Here are Rumpke's guidelines on holiday pick-up schedules:

- If the holiday is the day of or a weekday before your service day: Service will be delayed one day that week
- If the holiday is on a weekday after your service day or Saturday/Sunday: Service will remain as scheduled

Fire Department

Your Bellbrook Fire Department



The Bellbrook Fire Department is a combination department with seven full-time employees and 13 part-time employees. The fire services provided to the citizens of Bellbrook have a Class 2 Public Protection Classification (PPS), placing the community in the top 3 percent of those evaluated throughout the nation. The department



operates two engines, one ladder truck, three ambulances, and three staff/support vehicles. They also have 11 paramedics, 9 Emergency Medicals Technicians, and one medical director.

Winter Holiday Fire Facts

- Electrical distribution or lighting equipment was involved in almost half of the home Christmas tree fires.
- Nearly one in five Christmas tree fires were started by decorative lights. Candles started eight percent.
- Roughly two of every five home Christmas tree fires started in the living room.
- Year-round, more than one-third (35 percent) of home decoration fires were started by candles. This jumped to almost half in December when candles started 45 percent of such fires. Cooking started one-fifth (19%) of decoration fires.



Christmas Tree & Decoration Fires



Carefully decorating your home can help make your holidays safer. Between 2015-2019, U.S. fire departments responded to an average of 160 home fires that started with Christmas trees per year. U.S. fire departments responded to an estimated average of 790 home structure fires per year that began with decorations, excluding Christmas trees. Can Santa Find You?



Every second counts during a fire, police, or medical emergency. Valuable time can be lost if your house number is not clearly posted where emergency responders can see it. Police officers, firefighters, and EMS responders can't provide lifesaving services to you and your family if they cannot find your house. The Bellbrook Fire Department is offering to provide you with a highly visible sign for responders to locate your residence in a timelier manner, potentially saving time...and lives!

The signs are made of aluminum with a reflective color backing and 3" reflective white numbers on both sides. They are 6" wide and 18" tall. They are designed to be installed on a mailbox post for the greatest visibility from the street. For information on how to order your address sign, call the Fire Department at (937) 848-3272.

Service Department




About the Service Department

The Service Department operates and maintains the water system serving the city and part of Sugarcreek Township. Currently, the city has one employee with a Class 2 Operator's License and five employees with a Class 1 Operator's License. The Ohio EPA requires the city to have a minimum of one employee with a Class 1 Operator's License. The water system serves over 9,200 people in the City and Township. The department also maintains city streets, storm sewers, and city buildings.

Snow Removal

'Tis the season of snowfall! Please remember to:

- Move your cars off the street
- Do not plow, blow, or throw snow back into the roadway
- Do not allow children to make snow forts near the edge of the road



Reduce your speed and drive cautiously

The Bellbrook Service Department works hard to keep roads open for safe travel while conserving salt when possible. Each snow and ice event is evaluated independently, and the appropriate treatment will be applied. Please contact the city if you have any questions or concerns. We thank you for your understanding!

Storm Drain Dumping & Stream Pollution

To report an illegal discharge, call the Bellbrook Service Department at (937) 848-8415 Monday through Friday, 8:30 am to 4:00 pm. After hours, call (937) 848-8484. Storm drains are designed to handle storm-



water runoff only and do not provide treatment to water or other substances that enter the system. The Bellbrook Service Department manages the storm drain system in the city. Public education and participation in reporting sightings or evidence of suspicious substances being dumped down a storm drain or directly into our local creeks are an important part of preventing water pollution. Odors, unnatural colors, or dead fish are signs that something harmful has entered the water.

As part of our Illicit Discharge Detection and Elimination (IDDE) program, we ask citizens who suspect that they have witnessed illegal dumping into a storm drain or water pollution to contact the Bellbrook Service Department at the numbers above. If you are not sure whether an illegal discharge has occurred, please report it, and we will determine whether action is required to protect the water supply and the environment.

What are some examples of illicit discharges?

- "Gray water" such as laundry, shower, or kitchen wastewater
- Paints, solvents, cleaning products, and other toxic household substances
- Gasoline, motor oil, brake fluid, engine coolant (antifreeze), and other toxic automotive products
- Septic tank pump-out and other types of human or animal waste.
- Fertilizers, pesticides, herbicides, and other agricultural products
- Leaves, grass clippings, or yard waste of any kind
