General Fund Levy: November 7

On November 7, 2017, voters of the City of Bellbrook will be asked to vote on an additional 3.0 mill General Fund Levy. This levy is to provide funding for police, fire, emergency medical services, and other safety needs.

Maintain High Quality Services

Keeping our local safety services up to date and high quality, is a city priority. Investing in our city's safety services is necessary to sustain our low crime rate and emergency response times, maintain the quality of life in Bellbrook, and address the changing needs of our community.

- Fire Department rated in the top 3% nationwide by the Insurance Services Office.
- Police Department certified by the Ohio Collaborative Community-Police Advisory Board.


Fiscal Responsibility The city prides itself on being fiscally conservative, responsible, and transparent.

- A city levy for additional funding has not been on the ballot since 2009.
- Water rates have not increased since 2011 and waste collection rates have decreased.
- Police and fire dispatch consolidated with local agencies, saving Bellbrook residents approximately \$125,000 annually.
- In 2016, the city received the Auditor of State Award for a clean audit.
- This levy is less than \$9 a month per \$100,000 of property value.



Service Stability Over the last several years, cuts in state and federal funding have created a structural deficit for our city, and there is no indication this will be rectified in the future.

- The state has cut over \$1,000,000 in state-shared revenue to our city.
- The city will continue to make efforts to control costs without cutting services for as long as possible.



How the Levy will be used

- Maintain community policing programs, response times, and up-to-date equipment.
- Add one full-time firefighter position, as part-time and volunteer numbers are declining.
- Add one full-time police officer position to allow for a dedicated, school resource officer for schools located in the city.
- Earmark general funds to keep downtown safe and inviting for residents and visitors, including improvements to street lights and sidewalks.

Bellbrook Garden Club

The Bellbrook Garden Club members are restoring the Stephen Bell Elementary School courtyard in time for the 2017-18 school year. Funded by the school, Principal Ginger Keeton approved the garden design by club member and Master Gardener Vickie Carter. Bernice Stephen leads this collaborative effort with assistance from club members, school maintenance staff, and with donated labor from Tom's Mulch who graciously removed the courtyard sod. The garden will be a colorful outdoor classroom, complete with moveable benches, garden art, and diverse plants, herbs, and vegetables. Each year, the club conducts a science project for the entire Stephen Bell second grade that helps children understand soil, worms, composting, and their roles in the ecosystem.

The club planted hundreds of flowers and greenery in the city's downtown urns, the Winters' Library, and the Bellbrook Historical Museum gardens. Tom's Mulch donated many yards of mulch which the Bellbrook Service Department transported and spread with club members. Members care for the gardens until frost, and the city waters the urns. With Friends of the Library funds, the club also replaced shrubbery at the library with a Serviceberry tree.

City Council Updates

General Fund Levy - November City Council has requested a 3.0 mill 5 year General Fund levy be placed on the November ballot. A resolution was passed in July and forwarded to the Greene County Board of Elections.

Tax Budget In July, Council approved the annual tax budget ordinance. The tax budget is a financial plan for the operations of the next calendar year. The budget is submitted to the county budget commission and used to fix property tax rates. This is not the final budget that Council approves for the upcoming fiscal year.

School Security Agreements The School District has contracted with the city for a number of years to provide additional coverage to school properties during school hours and football games. Council approved security agreements for 2017 where the city will be reimbursed for this additional coverage.

Annual Wage Increase Following Council approval in July, City employees not covered by a collective bargaining agreement, received a 2.75% wage increase effective August 1. This wage increase was included in the 2017 budget.

Message Service Establishments In July, City Council approved the repeal and replacement of the code relating to Message Service Establishments. The ordinance was needed to update these regulations.

Collective Bargaining City Council approved a three year agreement with the Police union. The new agreement will take effect August 1.

Municipal Code Online The Municipal Code is now available online. The city is using MuniCode to provide the service. This easy to read and search format will help you to more easily find what you are looking for. The legislative and policy-making body of the City is comprised of a Mayor and six council members, elected at large on a non-partisan basis. The Council hires a professional City Manager who operates the city on a day-to-day basis.

The Works

2017 Paving Program The streets included in the 2017 Paving Program are Possum Run Road, Sugar Leaf Drive, Blue Stone Court, Red Rock Court, Sand Stone Court, and a portion of Regent Park Drive. The paving should be complete by the end of August.

Fire Hydrant Repainting The Service Department is currently in the process of repainting all 600+ fire hydrants on the city's water system.

Downtown Handicap Ramp Replacement The City was awarded over \$31,000 in Community Development Block Grant money to install 13 handicap accessible sidewalk ramps in the downtown area. The project has been awarded and a project start date is to be determined. The ramps are located on South East Street, North East Street and Ryder Court. The city actively seeks ways to find alternative funding to help offset project costs.

Upper Hillside Water Main Improvement Project The city has been awarded grant funding and a zero interest loan for the replacement of the water main in the Upper Hillside, Viewpoint, and Pinegrove Drive subdivision also known as Bellbrook Farms. The city will receive \$600,000 from the state and a zero interest loan for \$290,000. This project is part of the city's goal to keep our water system safe and reliable.



Water Updates

Fire Hydrant Flushing The Service Department will be flushing hydrants during the week of October 9 to 13. Flushing is done each year to inspect the hydrants and water system for proper operation. Between the hours of 8:30 am and 3:30 pm, avoid doing laundry and set water softeners to bypass. For more information, call the Utility Billing office at (937) 848-4638.

Police Department Awards At the City Council meeting on May 22, Police Chief Doug Doherty presented two awards to members of the Police Department. Sergeant Keith Salyers was given the Meritorious Lifesaving Award for giving CPR to a person who stopped breathing. Keith successfully performed CPR until paramedics arrived on scene. Additionally, he received the Lifesaving ribbon from the American Police Hall of Fame for the same event. The Leadership Award was given to Lieutenant Steve Carmin for his accomplishments over the past three years. Steve coordinated the department's effort to be certified by the Ohio Collaborative Community-Police Advisory Board, implemented the department's use of body worn cameras, and completed Law Enforcement Executive training. Congratulations to both Sergeant Salyers and Lieutenant Carmin.

Property Maintenance Code To maintain the quality of life in our city, it is important to do all we can as homeowners or tenants to ensure that the highest property values are maintained in our community. Bellbrook's Streams

Our streams flow through our community from our neighbors located upstream. Since we all live downstream from someone, it is up to all of us to make clean and clear choices to keep our water clean.

In neighborhoods, stormwater runoff picks up pollutants from motor oil, lawn chemicals, pet waste, salt and litter along the way, before flowing directly into streams and rivers untreated.

- In your neighborhood, keep streams clean and storm drains clear. Do not throw leaves, grass, branches, gas, oil, fertilizer or other hazardous wastes in or near streams or storm drains.
- Pick up pet wastes promptly and dispose of properly.
- Limit the use of fertilizers and pesticides.
- Wash your car in the grass, so wash water will infiltrate into the ground rather than run off into the road.

Waste, Recycling & Yard Waste Disposal

Waste Collection Holidays Waste and recycling collection will be delayed one day due to the Labor Day and Thanksgiving Day holidays. Waste and recycling collection will take place on **Saturday, September 9** and **Saturday, November 25** for those weeks.

Bulk Pick-up Large items may be picked up by Rumpke on Fridays. However, you must call ahead and schedule with Rumpke at (800) 223-3960.

Yard Waste The City does not have leaf or yard waste collection service. However, residents may dispose of yard waste with regular trash collection. Rumpke will collect brush in bags or tied in bundles no larger than four feet long and two feet wide. Brown paper yard waste bags are not required by Rumpke.

Storm Drain Dumping & Stream Pollution

Lawn Care Don't overwater your lawn. Consider using a soaker hose instead of a sprinkler. Excess fertilizers and pesticides applied to lawns and gardens wash off and pollute streams. Use pesticides and fertilizers sparingly. When use is necessary, use these chemicals in the recommended amounts.

Automobiles Use a commercial car wash that treats or recycles its wastewater, or wash your car on your yard so the water infiltrates into the ground. Repair leaks and dispose of used auto fluids and batteries at designated drop-off or recycling locations.

Pet Waste Pet waste can be a major source of bacteria and excess nutrients in local waters. When walking your pet, remember to pick up the waste and dispose of it properly.

Report Suspected Illegal Discharges To report a suspected illegal dumping down a storm drain, call the Bellbrook Service Department at (937) 848-8415 Monday-Friday 7:30 am to 4:00 pm. For after-hours complaints, call (937) 848-8484.

Open Burning The summer is a popular time to cook out with friends and family. The Fire Department has the following regulations to follow when having an outdoor fire:

- The only material that can be burned is clean, dry wood as a fuel source.
- No yard waste, rubbish materials, or prohibited materials (defined by the Ohio Administrative Code) may be burned at any time.
- If the fire is contained in an approved container, such as an outdoor fireplace, barbecue pit, etc., the fire must be at least 15 feet from a structure or combustible materials.
- For an open fire not contained, the fire must be at least 20 feet from a structure, wood fence, neighboring structure or combustible materials. Conditions that could cause a fire to spread within 20 feet of the fire must be eliminated prior to ignition of a fire.
- The fire must be attended while burning and must be extinguished if it is not attended.
- A portable fire extinguisher, garden hose, bucket of sand or other suitable means for extinguishing the fire must be provided.
- The fire must not create an offensive or objectionable condition that interferes with the neighboring residents' use and enjoyment of their property. If this occurs, the Fire Department is required to request the person responsible for the fire to extinguish the fire or extinguish it itself. The Fire Department is required to extinguish fires, which create hazardous or nuisance conditions.

The most common complaint from neighbors is when recreational fires are not conducted in accordance with the rules and regulations, or when the environmental conditions cause the smoke to migrate off of the property into the residence of a neighboring property. Persons with chronic breathing problems can be affected by these conditions. We do not like to disrupt anyone's fun; however, we do have to follow the law.

If the Fire Department requests that you extinguish your fire due to non-compliance with the rules and regulations, or the fire causes an offensive or objectionable condition, you are bound by Ohio law to comply with the request. Failure to do so may result in you being charged with a violation of the open burning regulations.
