



Downtown Streetscape Master Plan Underway





The City of Bellbrook has contracted with the Kleingers Group to create a downtown streetscape master plan. This selection came after an RFP was put out and responded to by a number of firms. Kleingers was selected and the process to create the plan began in April. The plan will cover Franklin Street from Little Sugarcreek Road to Washington Mill Road and Main Street from Pavilion Lane to Maple Street. It will include suggestions to make the area safer for pedestrians, increased parking visibility, lighting improvements, landscaping and greenspace enhancements and more. The plan will serve as a guide for the future vision of the downtown area. 75% of the plan was funded by a Greene County Municipal Grant from the County Commissioners. The plan will be complete near the end of September and there will be opportunities for the public to give input on the plan. Departure of Melissa Dodd

Melissa has accomplished a diverse range of transformative projects and initiatives in her three years with Bellbrook. As both City Manager and Finance Director, Melissa efficiently and effectively managed city operations with expertise and positivity. She also enacted beneficial changes beyond the sectors of management and finance and into community development, planning & zoning, policy & legislation, grant writing, health & wellness, and other aspects of governance.

Most notably, Melissa completed numerous projects aimed at downtown improvement. Melissa worked with Greene County Regional Planning and carried out the first complete Comprehensive Plan update since 1974, which provided much-needed guidance for downtown revitalization. This plan thoroughly outlines guiding principles for preserving Bellbrook's history while making meaningful decisions for the future. Melissa also saw the North West Street Sidewalk project to fruition, which included the installation of sidewalk, curb, and ADA compliant ramps along the east side of North West Street near the Marathon gas station, for which Melissa secured a Community Development Block Grant that awarded \$35,177 of the project total \$55,102, with the city share being \$19,925. She also obtained a

grant from Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission Transportation Alternatives which awarded Bellbrook \$342,965 for pedestrian improvements on State Route 725 across Little Sugarcreek and the addition of a mid-block crosswalk to Dot's and a protected sidewalk across bridge and walkway connections from the multiuse path to the west and the edge of Bellbrook Artists Collective. She also launched a Downtown Beautification project that raised \$14,100 to purchase custom bike racks and benches installed across downtown.

In engaging with Bellbrook businesses and community members, Melissa sparked the creation of the groups For Bellbrook By Bellbrook, which brings together local business owners, and Bellbrook By Design, which seeks to move the community forward. Melissa also produced multiple events for the community. She implemented regular Farmers Markets in downtown, created and hosted the first annual Be Well Bellbrook event, and collaborated to bring the first Brook Mills 10k, which sold out with 300 runners and raised \$700 for the Bellbrook-Sugarcreek Community Support Center.

While COVID-19 strained the global community, Melissa worked with city staff to ensure the safe continuation of normal city operations. In addition, she oversaw and managed \$467,000 from the CARES Act (The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act). Also during this time, the North Belleview bridge washed away due to heavy rains in March; Melissa secured \$325,000 in Ohio Public Works Commission Emergency Program funding for the North Belleview Drive culvert replacement project, which was completed under budget and on time in October 2020.

The entirety of these accomplishments continues to positively influence Bellbrook's residents, businesses, and staff. Throughout her time in Bellbrook, Melissa worked to realize numerous priorities with determination and zeal, the success of which has made Bellbrook a better place to work, live, and grow.

Renewal Levy on November 2 Ballot

On November 2, 2021, the voters of the City of Bellbrook will be asked to vote on a Renewal 1.3 mill General Fund Levy. This levy was originally approved in 1962 and has either been renewed or replaced every 5 years. This General Fund Levy generates approximately \$226,039 per year and represents 21% of the General Fund budget.

The General Fund is the city's only non-restricted fund that is able to provide funding toward a number of projects and services as well as other funds in need of support such as Fire and Police. Funding provides basic operational services and amenities such as City Council/

Administration, Planning and Zoning, Library maintenance and the Bellbrook Historical Museum.

The City of Bellbrook is one of the few remaining cities in the state of Ohio that does **not** levy an income tax on its residents. The City relies on property taxes to fund critical city services provided to residents.

The levy is a Renewal and, with voter approval, taxes will <u>not increase</u>.

The effective rate and cost for property owners is actually 18% less than the cost in 2017.

Early voting begins on October 5.

Little Miami Watershed Network

Bellbrook in the spring often seems to be a maze of flowing water. The power of nature is apparent everywhere: Roads are closed due to high water, fields are flooded, and in 2020 one of our bridges was destroyed by a single storm. Some of us even have parts of our yards suddenly become a stream during heavy rain, but when the rain stops, it disappears just as quickly (these are called ephemeral streams). Most of this water will flow from the creek in your neighborhood to Little Sugar Creek, which flows to Sugar Creek and then on to the Little Miami River, a state and nationally recognized scenic river.

Now that August has arrived, the Little Miami is usually just a trickle. Most of its tributaries are dry, and it can be difficult even to determine where the ephemeral streams are. However, these waterways are just as crucial to our ecosystem as they are the rest of the year. They are also still home to a variety of species.

If you live close to one of Bellbrook's many streams and creeks, please do your part not to pollute them. Never dump anything, including grass clipping, leaves, and other yard waste, into any stream or river. Never litter and pick up any litter you find. Use pesticides and fertilizers only as specified on the bottle. Pick up all dog waste.

Brook Mills 10K Race



The mission of the Bellbrook Fire Department is to enhance the quality of life in our city and provide a healthy and safe environment. This is accomplished through the cultivation of community partnerships and promoting progressive public education and awareness.

Free Blood Pressure Checks

high blood pressure. High blood pressure increases your risk for serious health problems, including stroke and heart attack. Hypertension is the medical term for high blood pressure. High blood pressure usually has no symptoms, so it is sometimes



called a "silent killer." The only way to know if you have high blood pressure is to get tested. That is why your Bellbrook Fire Department is offering FREE blood pressure checks every Friday 10 am to 11 am at Station 22 (4254 West Franklin St).

Severe Weather



Severe weather can happen anytime, in any part of the country. Severe weather can include hazardous conditions produced by thunderstorms, including damaging winds, tornadoes, large hail, flooding and flash

flooding, and strong winds. Everyone needs to know what to do in the case of a weather emergency. In general, it is recommended that everyone be prepared to sustain themselves for a minimum of three days. The key to this advance planning is keeping an emergency kit, having an emergency plan, and staying informed. A great resource for implementing these three steps can be found at www.ready.gov. This site will provide you with details and suggestions to be prepared for the unpredictability of severe weather.

Open Burning

The summer is a popular time to cook out with friends and family. Your Bellbrook Fire Department has the following regulations to follow when having an outdoor fire:

- The only material that can be burned is clean, dry wood as a fuel source.
- No yard waste, rubbish materials, or prohibited materials (defined by the Ohio Administrative Code) may be burned at any time.
- If the fire is contained in an approved container, such as an outdoor fireplace, barbecue pit, etc., the fire must be at least 15 feet from a structure or combustible materials.
- For an open fire not contained, the fire must be at least 20 feet from a structure, wood fence, neighboring structure, or combustible materials. Conditions that could cause a fire to spread within 20 feet of the fire must be eliminated prior to the ignition of a fire.
- The fire must be attended to while burning and must be extinguished if it is not attended to.
- · A portable fire extinguisher, garden hose, bucket of sand, or other suitable means for extinguishing the fire must be provided.
- The fire must not create an offensive or objectionable condition that interferes with the neighboring residents' use and enjoyment of their property. If this occurs, the Fire Department is required to request the person responsible for the fire to extinguish the fire or extinguish it itself. The Fire Department is required to extinguish fires, which create hazardous or nuisance conditions. The most common complaint from neighbors is when recreational fires are not conducted in accordance with the rules and regulations or when the environmental conditions cause the smoke to migrate off the property into the residence of a neighboring property. Persons with chronic breathing problems can be affected by these conditions.

We do not like to disrupt anyone's fun; however, we do have to follow the law. Therefore, if the Fire Department requests that you extinguish your fire due to non-compliance with the rules and regulations, or the fire causes an offensive or objectionable condition, you are bound by Ohio law to comply with the request. Failure to do so may result in you being charged with a violation of the open burning regulations. About the Service Department

The Service Department operates and maintains the water system serving the city and part of Sugarcreek Township. Currently, the city has one employee with a Class 2 Operator's License and five employees with a Class 1 Operators License. The Ohio EPA requires the city to have a minimum of one employee with a Class 1 Operator's License. The water system serves over 9,200 people in the city and township. The department also maintains city streets, storm sewers, and city buildings.

Hydrant Flushing 2021



The annual fire hydrant flushing will occur the week of October 4 through October 8 from 8:30AM to 3:30PM daily.

Fire hydrant flushing is necessary for the general maintenance of the City's water system. It is also important to check the hydrants and make sure

that they are working properly in case of an emergency.

Please avoid doing laundry during this time. If discoloration of laundry occurs, a special detergent is available from the City. If you use a water softener, please set it to "by-pass" during this week. Water may appear "rusty" during the process, but will return to normal when the process is complete. Please call 848-4638 with any questions.

Garbage Container Placement Protocol

It is important to remind residents that any garbage or recycling container must not be placed out for pick up more than 24 hours before Friday pick-up and must be removed from the curb/end of the driveway no later than 24 hours after Friday pick-up. In addition, Bellbrook's Property Maintenance Code states explicitly that::

"Trash containers shall be removed from the public right of way not later than twenty-four hours after trash pick-up. The containers shall be returned to the public right-of-way area not earlier than twenty-four hours before the next trash pick-up."
